<u>Note:</u> Premium money may be withheld if animals are not cared for and/or pens/stalls are not cleaned on time each day. This includes being on time for pen duty assigned by Barn Superintendent.

GENERAL RULES and REGULATIONS

EVERYONE entering an exhibit at the Fair **MUST HAVE an EXHIBITORS NUMBER**.

These are available at the Extension Office. If you have had a number previously, you use the same number.

- 1. Premium money paid for exhibits & special awards will be limited to residents of Garfield County unless by Fair Board President invitation.
- 2.The Fair Board will provide a watchman to take all precautions for the safe preservation of all articles being exhibited, but will not be responsible for loss, damage, or injury to any property while being exhibited at the Garfield County Fair.
- 3. Exhibiting in the Fair does not entitle exhibitor to a pass for the fair.
- 4. All exhibits will be under the control and direction of the Fair Board while on exhibit. The barn superintendent has the authority to approve or disapprove entries. Allotment of space and management of each division will be in the hands of the superintendent.
- 5. Livestock to be entered & filed with superintendents by 9 a.m. on Friday (Except for 4-H and FFA market sale entries which are to be weighed by 6 p.m. Thursday). Other exhibits refer to the division for entry times & dates. All exhibits removed before 4 p.m. Sunday without permission of the superintendent will forfeit premium money.

ALL LIVESTOCK WILL BE TREATED HUMANELY BY EXHIBITORS. ALL BEEF CATTLE TIED OVERNIGHT MUST HAVE DOUBLE TIES.

- 6. Allotment of space & management of each division will be in the hands of the superintendent in that division.
- 7. All exhibitors will not be limited as to the number of entries in any one class, but no one individual exhibitor will be awarded more than 2 premiums on any one class unless otherwise specified. All livestock entries limited to 2 per class.
- 8. Judging shall be by the use of the Danish System. Each exhibit is judged on its own merits, irrespective of other entries. In all cases the judge's decision shall be final. Grand Champion will be declared at the discretion of the judge (with no number of exhibits set). All classes will be judged on a standard classification of Blue (B), Red (R), White (W). There can be several articles in the same class grading B and receiving blue ribbons if they meet the standard, or if none of the articles exhibited meet the standard for Blue there may not be any blue ribbons awarded only Red and White.
- 9. There are three departments: Open Class for adults and juniors; 4 -H 8 18 years, (age determined as of Oct. 1, of the prior calendar year). Exhibitors 18 and under not enrolled in 4-H or FFA will be entered in the junior division. All three departments will use the same premium list and class. 4-H is limited to enrolled 4-H members in grades stated on the entry form for the department that is being entered. Entries in each department will not compete with like entries in other departments. The same exhibits entered in one department may not be entered in another department.

For exhibitors 4 years old and under, due to age and need for exhibitor safety, an experienced individual must also be present in the ring while the animal is being exhibit- 8. Q-fever is a bacterial organism commonly ed.

- 10. Cash premiums will be paid for exhibits not listed in premium list at the discretion of the superintendent.
- 11. The judge may open canned foods at his/ her discretion.
- 12. Premium money availability to be announced by the Extension Office. Exhibitors please take note of "void after" date on your checks.
- 13. Only human exhibitors will receive premium Money

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Individual health certificates are not required for entry.
- 2. Fair veterinarian will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry including horses, pet animals, fur bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese & turkeys, before they are exhibited to determine that the livestock & poultry are free from infectious or contagious disease and ectoparasites. Fair veterinarian must reject any animal with infectious or contagious disease or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that ringworm, warts, pinkeye, scabies, lice, mites, ticks & fleas fall into these categories.
- 3. No animals from any quarantined premise will be permitted to enter the fair.
- 4. All out-of-state entries must comply with the State of Washington Import Regulations.
- 5. Any questions, call veterinarian.
- 6. It will be the responsibility of all livestock exhibits to engage the services and pay for the services of the veterinarian.

- 7. All sheep and goats exhibited must have a Scrapie tag or be tattooed with their Scrapie number.
- shed by sheep, goats and cattle. Goats and sheep in the last 14 days of pregnancy, and young lambs/kids less than 14-days of age, are most likely to be shedding this organism. This disease is communicable to humans.

Female goats and sheep within the last 14days of pregnancy, and young lambs/kids less than 14-days of age are not allowed to be exhibited at the Garfield County Fair.

GARFIELD COUNTY FAIR 4-H & FFA MARKET SALE REGULATIONS

- 1. The sale is open to exhibitors enrolled in Garfield County 4-H or Pomeroy FFA livestock projects by June 1, who have not graduated from high school. No switching enrollment groups later.
- 2. Each exhibitor may sell a single market animal of one species through the market sale. A second animal may be sold to the floor supporter at floor price only. No private treaty sales are allowed during the Fair on the Fairgrounds. Market animals not in the sale may be taken home without sale.
- 3. Animals must meet new minimum grade standards as follows:

Market Hog U.S. No. 1, 2, or 3 and weigh at least 230 pounds and no more than 300 pounds.

Market Lamb Prime, Choice or Good and weigh at least 110 pounds and no more than 170 pounds.

Market Steer Prime, Choice or Select and weigh at least 1,100 pounds and no more than 1,550 pounds.

Market Goat must weigh at least 65 pounds and no more than 130 pounds, born on/or after Nov. 1 of previous calendar year, dairy crossbred or Boer meat-type, no pygmy, angora and horn breeds.

- 4. Animals will be weighed off of truck. Individuals will only be paid for up to the maximum weight in the fair rules. Each exhibitor allowed one re-weigh.
- 5. Each exhibitor must show his or her own animal to qualify for the market sale, unless approved before hand by the sale committee.
- 6. Grand and Reserve Champion animals of each species must be sold through the market sale. All sale animals must be shown in confirmation and fitting and showing classes.
- Animals being prepared for other fall livestock shows will be shown as a separate class, and will not be sold through the market sale.
- 8. The market sale time is 4 p.m. in the sale arena.
- 9. Terms of the sale are cash. Buyers must pay the sale secretaries or arrange of payment before leaving the Fairgrounds.
- 10. Immediately after an animal is sold the seller will obtain a "Thank You" sign from the sale committee with name of buyer and seller on it, and display the sign neatly over the stall be formed, with only one champion and reor pen for the remainder of the fair. A photo of the seller and animal will be taken immediately after the animal is sold. No Exceptions! 11. Exhibitors will keep their pen/stalls clean and presentable from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. each day of the fair. Superintendents will


- Steers must be de-horned and healed with re-growth not to exceed 2 inches or polled.
- Steers must be halter broke and exhibitors must be capable of handling their own animals. A suitable lead rope must be available on loan to the buyer of steers at the close of the Fair.
- 15. A separate brand inspection slip for each steer must be in the possession of the beef superintendent before the animal can be transferred to the buyer.
- Required ownership dates for market animals are: May 15th for steers; June 15th for hogs; July 15th for lambs and goats. Contact your 4-H or FFA leader for weigh in dates.
- 17. Local buyers are responsible for the transportation of their livestock at the close of the Fair unless prior arrangements have been made.
- 18. A sales commission of three percent (3%) or a minimum of \$1.00 will be charged on all sales.
- 19. Steers identified as sold at auction at other fairs and shows are not allowed.
- 20. If five or less animals of any species are exhibited in 4-H or FFA, a combined class of both 4-H and FFA animals of that species will serve awarded.
- 21. All market animals (market sale, turn or take-home) must be shown both in confirmation and fitting and showing, or they cannot be sold unless pre-approved prior to weigh-in by the market sale association. Only prominent exceptions such as a physical injury or disease occurring within 45 days of the fair that jeopardizes the safety of the exhibitor and/or other exhibitors will be considered by the association

If an exception is granted, a designated alternate (another FFA member, 4-H member, or sibling) must be named at weigh-in to assist with the preparation, care, showing and selling of the animal.

22. All efforts will be made for exhibitors to receive their money within 60 days of the fair. 23. Only blue and red ribbon animals will be allowed to be sold at the market sale. Those animals with a white ribbon or below will be taken home by the exhibitor.

24. All 4-H and FFA sheep and goats exhibited must have a Scrapie tag or be tattooed with their Scrapie number.

Lambs and goats for the Market Sale must be tagged by the flock owner and exhibitors should purchase only Scrapie tagged market lambs and market goats. The Garfield County Fair Association, will not tag sale animals for Scrapie Identification. Flock owners and breeders may obtain Scrapie Tag information from the WSDA or the WSU Extension Office. FFA and 4-H market animal exhibitors must take their own animal through the Garfield County Fair market sale at their assigned sale order number. Additionally, any changes to said policy must be pre-approved by the 4-H or FFA advisor and the Garfield County Fair market sale committee. Violation of said rule will be penalized at the discretion of the Garfield County Fair market sale committee.



COMMERCIAL BOOTHS

Reserve space for commercial booths by calling the Extension Office at 509-843-3701. No leaflets of any kind will be handed out during the Fair except from a booth & with prior approval of the Fair Board. Political Candidates are not permitted to pass out fliers or campaign materials, nor carry signage through the fairground. Candidates are welcome to attend the fair as visitors and speak about their campaign ONLY if approached by an individual regarding their political campaign

COMMUNITY BOOTHS

Reserve space for community booths by calling Linda McKeirnan, 509-843-1633.

- 1. Any Grange, Home Economics Club, Civic Club, Service Club or Youth Group is eligible to enter a community booth.
- 2. Space allotted for booth will be 8 feet wide and 5 1/2 feet deep.
- 3. Organizations entering booths must reserve space from the Ext. Office by Aug. 22.
- 4. Articles entered in community booths will not be eligible to compete in other classes.
- 5. Booths are to be set-up by 8 p.m. Thursday.

PREMIUM CHECKS

Anything entered into the fair will earn premium points. All entry results will be calculated and a premium check will be issued to you. Checks will be available as soon as all results are entered and calculated, Premium checks may be picked up at the WSU/Garfield County Extension Office, 757 Main Street. Checks remaining or not cashed with in 90 days of being printed

will become forfeited and considered a donation to the Garfield County Fair. To Clarify, the checks will NOT be considered "abandoned" property under Chapter 63.29 RCW, but will be a donation by the payee to the Garfield County Fair. Prize money checks will NOT be issued or re-issued after 90 days.

Out of County entries do not earn premium points, ribbons only. If you have any questions, please call 509-843-3701.

4-H Livestock Management and Ownership

- 1. 4-H members in Washington State need not own their 4-H project animals. Members may lease a market animal if it is not sold at a junior livestock auction.
- 2. Animals must be under the 4-H member's care and management for the following periods of time prior to the official county exhibit activity:
- * Horse-90 days
- * Market Beef-120 days
- * Breeding Beef 90 days
- * All Types Goats 60 days
- * Sheep & Swine; Breeding & Market 90 days
- 3. Animals raised by the 4-H member from birth are exempt from the minimum periods of times listed above.
- 4. Showing of horned cattle: Market steers must be polled or dehorned, healed or re- growth not to exceed two inches from the hairline. Breeding beef animals should have safeguards on the horn tips; dehorning should be encouraged as a management practice.
- 5. No unaltered male livestock (beef, sheep, goat, swine, dairy or horse) may be exhibited, except beef bulls born in the current 4-H club year and rams under 24 months of age. All other prohibited.

- 1. Each contestant must use his/her own animal. One animal of one species.
- 2. Contest in beef, sheep, goat, swine, horse, poultry & rabbits as determined by superintendents.
- 3. Age divisions can be determined by superintendents, depending on number of entries.
- Feeder calves exhibitors eligible.
- 5. Contest is mandatory for market sale exhibitors. Animals must be shown in confirmation and fitting and showing or they cannot be sold unless pre-approved prior to weigh in by the Market Sale Association. Only prominent exceptions such as physical injury or disease occurring within 45 days of the fair that jeopardizes the safety of the exhibitor and/or other exhibitors will be considered by the association. If an exception is granted, a designated alternate (another FFA member, 4-H member, or sibling) must be named at weigh in to assist with preparation, care, showing and selling of the animal.
- 6. Exhibitors must fit their own animals. Parents cannot fit animals for exhibitors, or premium money will be forfeited. Only prominent exceptions such as a physical injury or premium money will be forfeited.

Round Robin Contest

Immediately following the completion of Feeder Steer, Swine, Sheep and Goat Show Finals on Saturday at approximately 1:00 pm. To include: Swine, Beef, Lamb, and Goat (if enough). The Round Robin Contest is an event in which the winners of each animal species in the Senior 4-H and Jr./Sr.

FFA Fitting and Showing divisions to compete against each other to determine the best overall 4-H and FFA Champion Showman.
